Simply Repair has been running Repair Cafés in Kendal since 2017, bringing together people with skills to repair, people who want to learn to repair and people who need things repairing. Repairing saves money, saves waste and saves the items we love. Learning how to fix something yourself makes you feel great and passing on our repair skills to others feels even better! We aim to reduce waste, share skills, improve wellbeing, build communities - and encourage a repair revolution!

We've supported seven groups to launch new Repair Cafés across the South Lakes, bringing this great resource to more communities and creating a surge of interest in repairing.

Kendal's Biodiversity Buzz



Biodiversity' has become a buzzword in recent years, and for good reason, as it is essential for human health and wellbeing, as well as making our public spaces more pleasant to spend time in. Biodiversity refers to the variety of all living things, from microbes in the soil that help plants to grow, to plants, insects and animals. Biodiversity, or 'biological diversity' contributes to healthy ecosystems, where a range of species depend on each other

Kendal Town Council is working on several initiatives around the town to support biodiversity, including creating wildflower areas, a wetland area, and more.

Wildflowers

How you can help...

· Sow native wildflowers to help support pollinators. Many species do well in containers, or even a window box if you're short of space. Cumbria Wildlife Trust has some helpful tips here on their website : www.cumbriawildlifetrust.org.uk

• Talk to your neighbours about creating a Hedgehog Highway to connect your back gardens. Hedgehogs typically roam 1.5 – 2 miles each night during the warmer months, so connecting their habitats is vital. Find out more: https://hedgehogsrus.co.uk/hedgehog-highway-project

· Avoid using chemical fertilisers and pesticides wherever possible, they can have far reaching effects beyond their intended purposes. Learn more here: www.pan-uk.org/our-environment

The UK has lost more than 97% of its wildflower meadows since the 1930s, with a knock-on effect on insects. including pollinators such as bees and **Biodiversity Grants** butterflies, as well as birds, bats and mammals. Kendal Town Council has introduced wildflower areas at Kendal Green, Aynam Rd and at Somervell

Did you know...?

1 in every 3 mouthfuls of food depends on pollinators

There are more than 9.000 different pollinator species in the UK. including bees, moths, butterflies, hoverflies, flies and beetles

Biodiversity not only refers to the variety of species, but the genetic variety within species that is essential to maintain healthy populations

Garden on Waterside. By introducing wildflowers to green spaces in our town, we are adding diversity and providing food and habitats for a variety of creatures. Wildflower meadows also help to store carbon, contributing (albeit in a small way) to mitigating climate change.

Wetland

Wetland areas have a been depleted in recent years. However, they can be hugely beneficial to a range of plant and animal life. Kendal Town Council is working with Kendal Conservation Volunteers to bring a wetland wildlife area to the new Canal Head allotments. Including a wildlife area in the allotment site will hopefully reintroduce frogs and toads, as well as dragonflies, damselflies, bees and butterflies to the area.

Kendal Town Council offers biodiversity grants to not-for-profit organisations or groups serving the people of Kendal, such as the Clean the River Kent group, Appleby Road Community Garden, Fellside Forum and Friends of Noble's Rest. If your organisation has a project that can help to increase biodiversity in Kendal, please get in touch.

Kendal Town Council has also supported Friends of Fletcher Park with funding to plant native bulbs in the park to support pollinators and provide springtime colour. If you'd like to help look after your local park or green space, why not join your local park's 'Friends of...' group, or start one where one doesn't already exist? DARK SKIES KENDAL

Kendal residents, inspired by the growing awareness of the impacts of light pollution, have replaced their outdoor lighting with dark skies friendly lighting. As the before and after pictures show, the dark skies light is warmer and casts downwards to prevent light pollution upwards. The lights also feature a motion sensor and connect to an app to enable time control to save electricity costs.

Belmont Brow resident, Julie Sharpe, says: "I really liked the low glare 'warmer' appearance of the lights above us along Cliff Terrace. When Jack Ellerby, Friends of the Lake District's Dark Skies Officer, explained that the less harsh colour is also friendly for wildlife, I'm all for that. We get Bats, Hedgehogs and Moths around our houses and gardens at night, and it's nice to think of their needs.'

Kendal Town Council are working with Dark Skies Cumbria to audit the footpath lighting we own and

Kendal Climate Hub Update

Kendal Town Council, together with Stricklandgate House and Waste into Wellbeing, are developing funding bids to create an enhanced space for Kendal People's Café at Stricklandgate House.

The new space will link Café customers to climate action projects across Kendal and invite everyone to suggest ideas and share their needs, helping to shape and influence what the hub provides going forwards.

A successful 'Hub Shaping Event' took place at Stricklandgate House where people shared their ideas ranging from a repair space, bike library and e-bike service to solar advice and grant information. The event confirmed the need for the project to address both climate and cost of living challenges and highlighted how the solutions to both are often the same, creating multiple community co-benefits.
