For my two chosen charities, the challenges have been immense, but my admiration for their dedication to the causes of debt relief and recovery from addiction has only grown. I tip my Mayoral hat one more time to Kendal Debt Centre and the Well Communities.

A YEAR OF CHANGE

This has been a turbulent year for local authorities in Cumbria, as the upheaval of Local Government Reorganisation came hard on the heels of Covid and all that entailed. But Kendal Town Council emerges in the new landscape with renewed vigour. We have new offices in the Kendal Business Hub and a new plan, to guide us to what we hope will be a bright future for our town. This year saw us put into practice some of our longer term aims to reduce the impact of Climate Change.

From new allotments to pushing forward plans to reduce vehicle speeds, and from planting wildflowers to helping people find access to solar power, we're responding to the recommendations of our Citizens' Jury. But as you'll see elsewhere in this report, we've also continued to invest in our local community, its groups, festivals and environment. Our new Plan has five priority areas. We've been making headway on many of these already and we anticipate that much more will follow in the coming year.

Climate Change and Biodiversity

Following the success of the Council's Kendal Climate Citizens' Jury initiative, the Council has worked hard to keep Climate Change at the top of its list of priorities. In 2022-23 this meant:

- Expanding allotments to provide more local growing space: We've extended Canal Head allotments to create additional plots, doubling allotment provision and bringing derelict land back into cultivation.
- Creating a 'one stop shop' for Climate Action: We've committed £30,000 and supported funding applications to generate additional money for partners like Waste into Wellbeing, to create an advice hub for people to learn how they can take their own Climate Action.
- Raising awareness: We created the Zero Carbon Kendal website and instagram page to share information (£2,500 plus staff time).

- Planting more trees and improving biodiversity: The Town Council created a Biodiversity grant and project fund of £16,000 (and staff time) to support and initiate community initiatives including Wildflower planting at Somervell Garden, Aynam Road and Kendal Green and over £5,000 funding Biodiversity projects across Kendal.
- Solar Made Easy Kendal: In partnership with CAfS the Town Council has allocated £5,000 to support this initiative.
- Make it easier to walk and cycle: The Town Council has allocated £54,000 towards 20mph and improving footpaths throughout Kendal following a footpath audit which focuses on school routes.

- Repairing historic walling and improving paths at Noble's Rest.
- New signage and planters at Woolpack Yard.
- Gold in Cumbria in Bloom for our award-winning floral displays and the town's vibrant community projects.
- Safeguarding open spaces at Mintsfeet riverside and Vicarage Drive.
- Investing £150,000 over four years to improve the floodwall plans at Waterside and Aynam Road with best-in-class glass panels.

A Thriving Town

- The Town Council invested £20,000 to keep the Christmas lights twinkling in the run up to Christmas, and formed a great partnership with Kendal Mountain Festival to deliver an exciting Switch-on, which included a dramatic Dark Skies 'Switch-off'.
- The Town Council supported 15 local festivals with over £40,000.
- The Town Council continued to support visit-kendal.co.uk, now with over 11,000 page hits, monthly.
- Supported partners to bid for Levelling Up Fund.
- Maintained banners and bunting throughout the town centre.
- Opened up the Mayor's Parlour for monthly public talks.

Supporting People and Communities

The Town Council supports:

- 21 local community groups with over £40,000 worth of funding.
- The Council led the Town's celebrations of the late Queen's Jubilee, and the ceremonies to mark her passing and the accession of the new King.
- The Mayor's Charity Fund raised over £3,000 for his Kendal Debt Centre and the Well Communities.

Getting Around

The Town Council has been campaigning for several years to introduce a 20mph speed limit across all of Kendal. It sees this as just one step in a process that transforms the way we move around our town. In 2022 we:

- Continued to support the lowering of speed limits in Kendal to 20mph.
- Surveyed the town's footpath network and developed a plan for improvement.
- Promoted cycling through support for the town's new Cycling Festival and the Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP).
- Earmarked future investment for improvements and working with partners.

The Coming Year

- Securing access improvements at Mintsfeet Riverside.
- Developing a Sustainability Hub in the town centre.
- Supporting Torchlight and Kendal Mountain Festival and developing the Christmas Lights switch on.
- Representing Cumbria in Britain in Bloom.
- Exhibition on Slavery from Council Collections.
- Glass flood wall begins on Waterside and Aynam Road.




How is your Council Tax Spent?

Most of the Town Council's income comes from the Council Tax, collected from residents within the civil parish of Kendal. Set alongside the tax collected to pay for other authorities, the Town Council share of the 'precept' accounts for around 2.2% of an average Council Tax bill. In 2022, we precepted £502,285 in an income of £629,446. The Council raises a small amount through allotment rents and other sources of income, and is allocated a share of the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) from developments in the town. A small team of staff deliver the Council's services. In 2022-23 we spent around £587,536 on delivery, grants and services, with the remainder being committed to Reserves.
